







The first thing that meets the traveler's eye upon entering Brimfield from the east on Route 150 is the old Guyer homestead, now the property of Mr. and Mrs. David Fletcher. It is believed to be nearly 140 years old.

The property has not changed hands very many times. The late Robert Tucker purchased the property from Harrietts and the Bostic family purchased the property from Tucker a few years back, who owned the property until Mrs. Riggs Bostic sold the house to Mr. and Mrs. Fletcher last year and moved to the trailer park just east of Brimfield.

It is one of the oldest liveable houses in Brimfield, built of brick and wood trim.

Oats he sold quite readily at 25 cents a bushel and wheat for 68 cents. This was 7 cents below the market price as 'it was not




